Professor Bruce Judd

Bruce Judd is Professor and Director of the Australian School of Architecture and Design (ASA+D) at UNSW. He has a BArch(hons) and PhD in Architecture and has taught in the Architecture and Urban Design programs at UNSW for over 30 years. His teaching and research have focussed on the relationship between housing/urban design and human behaviour. He was the inaugural Director of the Australian Housing and Urban Research Centre (AHURI) at UNSW and Deputy Director of the City Futures Research Centre with which he continues to be associated. His recent research with City Futures has focussed on aspects of population ageing and the built environment having led three major AHURI funded research projects on older homelessness, older home owners and downsizing.

Guy Luscombe

Guy Luscombe is an award winning architect and Director of AJA, a small-medium Sydney based architectural practice. He has spent over twelve years focussing on how design can improve the built environment for the aged. He has designed a multitude of projects for older people at all levels of need, written extensively on design and ageing and is a regular speaker at conferences and in the media on the subject. He was the principal author of "Creating

Caring Communities", the design guide for a major aged care provider and co-editor of the book, "Beyond Beige: Improving architecture for older people and people with disabilities". In 2014 he completed a Byera Hadley Travelling Scholarship to study innovative buildings for the aged in Europe called "The NANA project: New Architecture for the New Aged".

Dr Jane Bringolf

Jane Bringolf has a background in community services spanning more than thirty years. Her experience ranges from direct service provision to senior management roles. A recipient of a Churchill Fellowship in 2004, Jane travelled overseas to investigate organisations pursuing universal design, accessible environments and assistive technology. She then went on to do a PhD in urban studies specifically looking at industry barriers to universal design in Australian housing. Jane's nine years as Executive Director with the Independent Living Centre NSW, and more recently as Liveable Communities Project Manager with Council on the Ageing NSW, adds to her experience of working in the aged and disability sectors.
