- **1.** Alma welcomes everyone, Apologies Robert Philips from Mirimar Ave.
- 2. 7.02pm Minutes Accepted from last meeting. Tamarama kiosk response, there is no actual response to the motion. Update is that the Tamarama Surf Club builder has gone into administration and building works are therefore further delayed and/or stopped. Council is aware and is assisting in discussions on how subcontractors can continue. The consultation is therefore yet to have started as of a few weeks ago given this development.

4. Item for Discussion – Flood Study

- David Lesmond (Resident) attended from Bronte Beach Precinct to give an-update and background on the 2021 Flood Study that is currently progressing. Categories are no flood rating, low, medium and high. What needs to be determined is the impact this study and the adoption of its findings will have on property prices, insurance premiums, and future development controls. This requires Council to do a peer review, which has been undertaken.
- There is a lack of understanding in the community which needs to be further addressed and explained.
- Questions have been put to council and the Mayor has advised that Sharon Cassidy will be responding with explanations.
- It is obvious the current historic Storm Water systems can't cope and this is the major contributing factor rather than storm events. Increased built land is diminishing the ability of water to escape during storm events any other way than the stormwater system.
- Council is also aware of the fact the storm water systems can't cope, it is the
 community's opinion that Council, and Sydney Water should be addressing the short
 comings and not passing the burden onto the residents who have no power to
 improve outdated local storm water assets.
- Where does the liability lie? No answer to that question yet.
- Low risk impact might be minor. Major implications to DAs and insurance premiums is the concern.
- Methodology testing is in motion we believe.
- Report coming to Council in mid-June, which will disclose what Council was presented with. Some precinct information events planned.
- Cr Kay pushed hard for the review, otherwise the study would have just been adopted through the coming DEP. They have line contour maps which are more detailed than the proposed maps being used.
- It's an algorithm-based model. Problems being identified as with many algorithms.

Garbage Collection

- Should it happen later? It is currently very early, Belgrave street and back lane very noisy and very early.
- School traffic and depot drop off the main factors leading to the early start.

Parking of Business Trucks

- Current increase in the issue of business trucks taking up the residential car spaces. Mainly to do with construction sites, builders, construction trucks, furniture vans.
- Grant looked further into it and investigated the current law. The Road Rules state: 'The driver of a heavy vehicle, or long vehicle, must not stop on a length of road in a built-up area for longer than 1 hour, unless the driver is permitted to stop on the length of road for longer than 1 hour by information on or with a traffic control device, or under subrule (2A), (2A–1) or (2A–2)' A heavy vehicle is one with GVM

greater than 4.5 tonnes; a long vehicle is one over 7.5 metres. Trucks that are not 'heavy vehicles' can park legally in built-up areas for longer than one hour.

General Business

- Resident Michael Doonan drew the meeting's attention to a crane issue at 13
 Thompson St Tamarama. There is a privacy issue, the cabin of the large crane looks directly into the bedrooms of 3 houses. No one is happy about this, and wonders whether this should have been evaluated at the DA process stage? Privacy is often compromised but this is a fairly odd invasive situation.
- Bus Shelters. Resident Michael Doonan also reads a letter to The Beast (local publication) where a correspondent conveyed dismay at the bus shelters including North Bondi. (See appendix for article copy).
- It seems the flyers are not being delivered in parts of the precinct area again. Motion:

Bronte Precinct asks council whether the contractors employed to deliver the notification flyers delivered to Murray St, Hewlett St and Read St given they were not received at those locations.
